

Summary of SB 5 (De León- September 12, 2017 version)

California Drought, Water, Parks, Climate, Coastal Protection, and Outdoor Access For All Act of 2018

Highlights for the Bay Area:

- \$55 million in dedicated funding for the Coastal Conservancy for Bay Area projects, and another \$55 million in statewide programs for coastal forests, estuaries, and visitor serving accommodations
- \$6 million in dedicated funding for Bay Area watersheds (Los Gatos Creek, Guadalupe River and Russian River)
- Over \$1 billion in statewide funding for state and local park projects, trails and greenways
- Over \$160 million in statewide funding for wildlife corridors, endangered species habitat, fishery, and watershed restoration projects
- Over \$60 million in statewide funding for agricultural land conservation and stewardship projects

State and Local Parks, Greenways, and River Parkways

- \$285 million in funding for local parks (per capita and other programs)*
- \$218 million in funding for State Parks to *“create, expand...and improve parks and park facilities”**
- \$30 million for trail and greenway investments* (Natural Resources Agency)
- \$3 million for Los Gatos Creek and Upper Guadalupe River
- \$3 million for Russian River

Coastal Conservancy

- \$20 million for restoration grants to match Measure AA
- \$21.25 million for San Francisco Bay Conservancy Program
- \$14 million for San Francisco Bay Area Conservancy Program (Ocean Protection Trust Fund)
- \$20 million for coastal forests*
- \$5 million for coastal dune, wetlands, and estuary protection*
- \$30 million for *“lower cost coastal accommodation grants”**

Wildlife Conservation Board/California Department of Fish and Wildlife

- \$48 million to Wildlife Conservation Board for wildlife corridors and open space*
- \$115 million for fishery and riparian restoration projects*

Department of Conservation/Department of Food and Agriculture/CalFire

- \$60 million for agricultural land conservation and stewardship*
- \$25 million for *“for ecological restoration of forests”* including urban forests*

* This indicates that this is a statewide funding program for which we would have to compete
